9. As a minimum, at least one leader trained in Emergency Aid must accompany every visit and where separate sub-groups of young people will be created during the course of a visit, each must have a similarly trained leader. Consideration needs to be given to the need for more comprehensive first aid training when supervising adventurous and outdoor activities and particularly in remote environments.

The Group Leader should be aware and have taken account of any existing medical conditions and/or special needs that group members may have.

Before undertaking any off-site activities, the head teacher should assess what level of first-aid provision is needed. The HSE recommends that, where there is no special risk identified, a **minimum** stock of first-aid items for travelling first-aid containers is:

- a leaflet giving general advice on first aid
- six individually wrapped sterile adhesive dressings
- one sterile unmedicated wound dressing approximately 18cm x 18cm
- two triangular bandages
- two safety pins
- individually wrapped moist cleansing wipes
- one pair of disposable gloves

Again, equivalent or additional items are acceptable. Additional items may be necessary for specialised activities.

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Your workshop leader offsite will not be first aid trained, but we will have first aid trained managers onsite who can assist.
